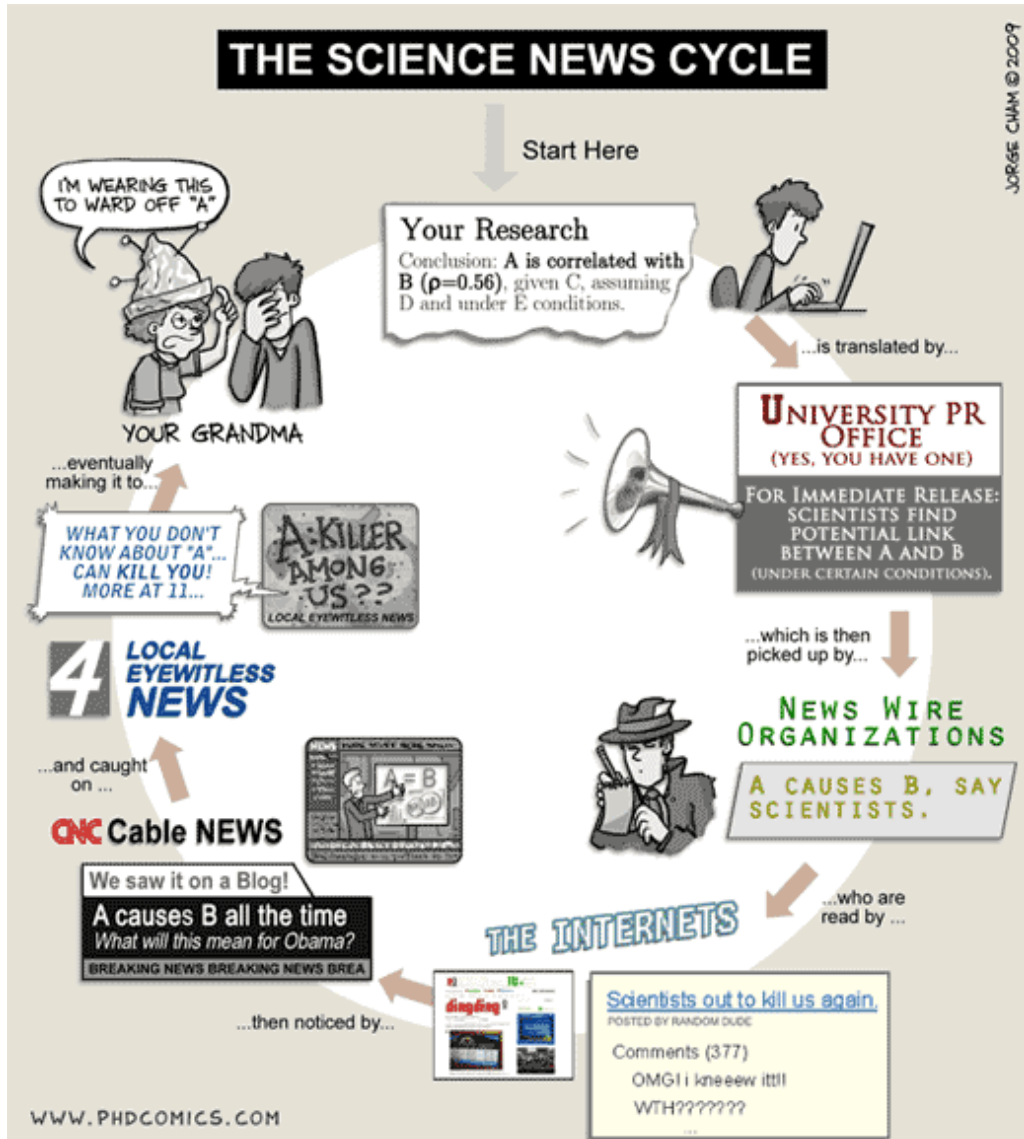

Course Description

This course introduces students to systematic methods that organize the research process and multiple forms of research that it includes. The course explains the logic of research design, explores some common forms of data-gathering (such as interviews, surveys, observation, etc.), and links them to issues of data reporting. The course provides basic research skills for use to students as either original producers or critical consumers of social research.

What should I expect to get from this course?

By the end of this course, you will:

- Be familiar with the various methods of research utilized in sociology.
- Be able to formulate a research question and hypotheses.
- Be a better consumer of academic research, but also of information in general.
- Be able to identify the strengths and weaknesses of quantitative and qualitative research methods.

Required Book(s)

Babbie, Earl. 2013. *The Practice of Social Research, 13th Edition*. Belmont, CA: Wadsworth.

*There will also be a few research articles and book excerpts that you will be required to read.

What will I do in this class?

1. **Exams:** There will be three exams throughout the course. Each exam will be worth 20% of your final grade. They will be a mix of multiple choice questions, true false questions, and short answer questions. The due dates for the exam will be posted in the course calendar as well as on the class's Canvas page.
2. **Research Proposal:** At the end of the semester you will be required to create a research proposal. The combined portions of this assignment will be worth 20% of your final grade. More information on this assignment and its subcomponents will be available on Canvas shortly after the beginning of the semester. This project will be subdivided into different parts throughout the semester:
 - a. **Topic Approval:** This assignment will be a short paragraph detailing a topic you are interested in studying. You will also provide a preliminary research question and why it is significant.
 - b. **Preliminary Bibliography:** This assignment will be a short list of bibliographic references to show that you are beginning some research on your topic. The list must contain *at least* 10 references from social science journal articles.
 - c. **Annotated Bibliography:** For this assignment, you will provide a short summary of 5 important sources you will use in your research proposal. These summaries will explain why the article is of importance to your research proposal.

- d. **Peer Review:** In this assignment, you will be required to review a rough draft of another student's research proposal. You will provide them with constructive criticism and possible insights that they may be overlooking.
 - e. **Final Research Proposal:** This will be the final result of the previous work. The final proposal will be between 4-5 (double-spaced) pages. Here you will outline your final research question, hypotheses, proposed methods, and a short literature review.
3. **Research Ethics Certification:** You will complete research ethics training through the Internal Review Board (IRB). It is done online, and you will either submit a screen-shot via Canvas or bring a printed version to class of your completed (and passed!) certification.
 4. **Research Analysis:** Here, you will choose a research article from a provided list and write a 1-2 page (double-spaced) analysis of the research, specifically paying attention to the methods utilized in the research.
 5. **Attendance:** You should attend class as much as possible, however, life happens on occasion. Should you have the need to miss class, that is fine; however, if it becomes a habit it will impact your grade. You are allowed to miss class 3 times without penalty, however beyond that each class missed will result in a one percent drop in your final grade up to a total of 5%.

You will submit all assignments online via Canvas unless otherwise noted above.

**If you are having trouble with any of the above assignments or are having anxiety about the exams or assignments, do not hesitate to contact me. This class is designed for you to be able to be a better consumer/creator of research, not for you to stress out!*
